Background information:

Mzansi Ballet:

Founded by Mr. Dirk Badenhorst (Director) in 2017, Mzansi Ballet is a truly unique dance company, identifying and cultivating young South African talent, Mzansi Ballet brings these dancers together with seasoned professionals to create pieces that tell truly South African Stories, as well as staying true to the cultural and historical accuracy of the Classical Ballets. The company has been very involved with communities around Johannesburg to grow and develop and foster opportunities for these young people and to create jobs and find ways for them to become self-sufficient. These dancers and choreographers from townships such as Soweto and Alexandra are given training in Ballet and are also trained to become teachers in the Cuban Ballet Methodology known as CuDanSA. This has been creating a multiplying effect in that the each of the teachers trained are now training many more students. Some of these young dancers and teachers are now becoming part of the Mzansi Ballet School which trains young dancers from across Gauteng in the Cuban Methodology as part of our vision to transform ballet in South Africa, Africa and the world. Moreover, we recognize the importance of making the arts accessible to everyone, including less fortunate communities. To this end, we are dedicated to assisting such communities in gaining access to theaters and, by extension, the enriching experience of "The Gold Rhino of Mapungubwe." His Excellency, **Fahd bin Abdulmohsan Al-Rasheed** was appointed by Royal Decree as Advisor in the General Secretariat of the Council of Ministers of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia on April 2nd, 2023. Al-Rasheed chairs the Saudi Conventions and Exhibitions General Authority and represents the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia as a lead on the Urban 20 from 2020. Dr. Nasiphi Moya, Mayor of Tshwane, South Africa

Dr. Nasiphi Moya is the mayor of City of Tshwane. Cllr Moya joined ActionSA in 2021 as Chief Governance Director and was sworn in as a PR Councillor in Tshwane in January 2023. She rose swiftly through the ranks, serving as Deputy Mayor from January 2024 and was elected Executive Mayor of Tshwane on 9 October 2024. Cllr Nasiphi Moya is a seasoned public policy and governance expert with a strong academic foundation and a dynamic political career. Anaclaudia Roszbach, UN-Habitat



Anacláudia Roszbach is the Executive Director of UN-Habitat and an economist with over 20 years of experience in housing, informal settlements, and urban policies. She was appointed Executive Director of UN-Habitat at the Under-Secretary-General level by the General Assembly, following nomination by the UN Secretary-General on 7 June 2024. Emilia Saiz, UCLG

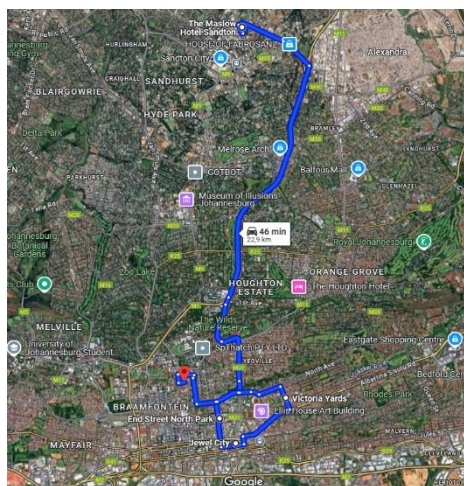

The Inner City Regeneration Tour aims to provide a real sense of Johannesburg Life. Expect to experience the sights, smells, sounds and taste our unique, vibrant and challenging City. The visit aims to demonstrate both the challenging components of the City of Johannesburg and key successful interventions by both the City, Province and Private Partners and will include sites/projects which, simultaneously demonstrate the U20 themes as well as transformation and the complexity of redeveloping inclusive urban spaces, through integrated and collaborative partnerships - the whole of society approach where no-one is left behind.



Constitution Hill: A powerful symbol of South Africa’s democratic transition, now serving as a cultural, civic, and entrepreneurial anchor. Jewel City: A former industrial zone transformed into a thriving mixed-use precinct. Victoria Yards: An outstanding example of grassroots-led urban innovation. Located within the Maker’s Valley, it integrates urban agriculture, local enterprise support, community skills training programmes, creative industries, and water-sensitive urban design. Delegates will learn about the “Water for the Future” project, which supports ecological restoration of the Jukskei River, enhancing both sustainability and community livelihoods.

The GCRO is a partnership between the Gauteng Provincial Government, organised local government in Gauteng, the University of the Witwatersrand and the University of Johannesburg that is aimed at conducting independent research on social, economic, environmental and governance dimensions of the city-region. Between 2011 and May 2021, Rashid headed the Gauteng Planning Commission in the Office of the Premier (Governor) of the Gauteng Province. He was responsible for transversal strategic, spatial and infrastructure planning and performance monitoring and evaluation. He also headed the Delivery Support Unit in the Office of the Premier that sought to accelerate service delivery priorities across Gauteng provincial departments. Mayor Kassis was born in Jerusalem, raised in diaspora and returned in 2001 to serve his country / Palestine. Kassis is married and has two daughters. Professor Geci Karuri-Sebina is a scholar-practitioner who works in the intersection between people, place, time and technological change. She currently serves as an Associate Professor of digital governance at the University of Witwatersrand's School of Governance where she leads the Tayarisha Centre for Digital Governance, and coordinates the Civic Tech Innovation Network. Geci has recently co-edited two seminal volumes on digital governance in Africa: *Digitalisation and Public Policy in Africa: GovTech and CivicTech Innovations* (2025, Palgrave Macmillan), and *Africa's Digital Transformation and its Governance* (forthcoming, African Minds/ Leuven University).

Mr. Rodrigo Neves, Mayor of Niteroi, Brazil



Mr. Rodrigo Neves is a Brazilian politician affiliated with the Democratic Labor Party (PDT). Elected to his third term as mayor of Niterói, Rodrigo's history of dedication to public life is marked by a deep commitment to social justice, reducing inequality, and sustainable development. Graduated in Social Sciences from the Fluminense Federal University (UFF), Rodrigo began his activism at a young age, joining the Niteroiense Union of Secondary Students (UNES), where he led movements such as the defence of free public transport for students and the "painted faces" movement, which called for ethics in politics. His political career began in 1996, when, at age 21, he became Niterói's youngest city councillor. Re-elected in 2000 and 2004, he went on to the Rio de Janeiro State Legislative Assembly (Alerj), where he served two terms as a state representative. During this period, he authored important legislation, such as the Master Plan for the Metropolitan Region and the State Council of Cities. In 2010, Rodrigo was invited to take over the State Secretariat of Social Assistance and Human Rights. In this role, he launched the Rio Sem Miséria program, a pioneering program in Brazil, aimed at overcoming extreme poverty. Elected mayor of Niterói in 2013 and re-elected in 2017, Rodrigo faced significant challenges upon inheriting a city with serious fiscal and administrative problems. Focusing on planning and management, he reorganized the municipality's finances, restored the quality of public services, and implemented innovative policies. During the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, his leadership put Niterói in the national spotlight with unprecedented measures such as the creation of a dedicated hospital for coronavirus treatment, street sanitization, and programs like Temporary Basic

Income and Citizen Company. After leaving office as mayor with an 80% approval rating, Rodrigo returned to public administration in February 2023 as executive secretary of the Niterói City Hall, at the invitation of Mayor Axel Graef. He took on the role with the mission of supporting the implementation of the Niterói 450 Years Plan, the largest set of projects in the city's history, reaffirming his commitment to public policies focused on the most vulnerable populations.

Dr. Cemil Tugay, Mayor of İzmir, Turkey



Dr. Cemil Tugay is a medical doctor and experienced public leader with a distinguished career spanning healthcare, academia, and local governance. He graduated from the Faculty of Medicine at Ege University in 1989 and initially served as a general practitioner in Çorum and Tire. Between 1993 and 2000, he specialized in Plastic Surgery at İzmir Atatürk Training and Research Hospital, where he also completed his specialist doctorate. During this period, he broadened his expertise with a year of research at the Cleveland Clinic in the United States. Following his specialization, Dr. Tugay worked as a Plastic Surgery specialist at Karşıyaka Public Hospital (2001–2005) and İzmir Çiğli Kent Hospital (2005–2009), before establishing his own private practice in Karşıyaka in 2009. Alongside his medical career, he became actively involved in professional associations, serving in leadership positions within the Turkish Medical Association, the İzmir Chamber of Medicine, and the Turkish Plastic Surgery Association. Dr. Tugay entered public service as a member of the Republican People's Party (CHP) in 2010, holding several executive and advisory roles within the party at provincial and district levels. In 2019, he was elected Mayor of Karşıyaka Municipality, a position he held until 2024. In June 2024, Dr. Tugay was elected President of the Union of Healthy Cities of Turkey, where he continues to champion policies that promote healthier, more sustainable urban environments.

Aissata Camara, U20 Sherpa New York, United States of America



Aissata M.B. Camara is a global strategist and public servant dedicated to bridging local action with international solutions. As Commissioner & Chief of Staff in the NYC Mayor's Office for International Affairs, she advises city leadership on global policy, manages diplomatic incidents, and ensures NYC remains a trusted global partner. Aissata collaborates with the United Nations, Consulates, international organizations, and the private sector to shape policy, drive economic diplomacy, and advance the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). She has led award-winning initiatives, including the NYC Junior Ambassadors program and the Voluntary Local Review movement, now adopted by 330+ cities worldwide. A Fulbright Specialist, global advocate, and sought-after speaker, Aissata shares insights on subnational diplomacy, gender equity, and inclusive economic growth at the UN and major global forums. Her work has been featured in The New York Times, AMNY, The Guardian,

PBS, and Deutsche Welle. Named to the Most Influential People of African Descent (MIPAD) Hall of Fame, a Baruch College Alumni Changemaker, a Thomson Reuters Trust Conference Changemaker, and honored for public service innovation, Aissata is driven by a vision to build resilient, inclusive, and globally connected communities.

Science 20, Thokozani Majozi,



Thokozani Majozi is the Executive Dean of Engineering and the Built Environment and a full professor in Chemical and Metallurgical Engineering at Wits University, where he also holds the NRF/DST Chair in Sustainable Process Engineering. He is renowned for his research in process integration, particularly for developing frameworks and models for batch plants, zero-effluent chemical facilities, and membrane network systems, widely adopted by industry. Previously, he served as associate professor at the University of Pretoria and the University of Pannonia in Hungary. He holds a PhD in Process Integration from the University of Manchester Institute of Science and Technology, obtained through a Commonwealth Scholarship. Prof Majozi is President of the Academy of Science of South Africa (ASSAf) and the 2025 Science20 (S20) President, a fellow of multiple academies including AAS and the UK's IChemE and is a registered Professional and Chartered Engineer. His numerous accolades include the Zdenek Burianec Memorial Award (Italy), multiple NSTF and NRF President's Awards, the S2A3 British Association Medal, and the AU-TWAS Award. In 2019, he received the Order of Mapungubwe in Bronze, South Africa's highest national honour. He has authored over 300 scientific publications, including four books on chemical process integration and water management, and previously chaired the CSIR Board.

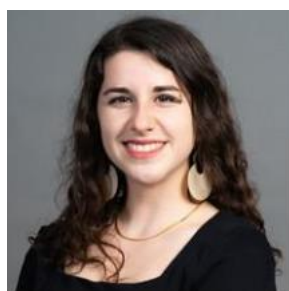

Rohey Malick Lowe, Mayor of Banjul, Gambia

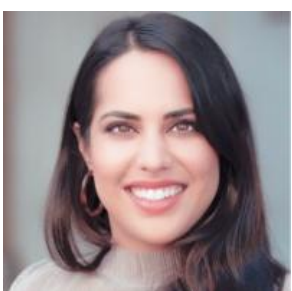

She was elected as the Mayor of the City of Banjul in May 2018 and was re-elected to the mayoral seat after a resounding victory at the hotly contested May 2023 polls. Her second term reaffirmed her popularity and the trust Banjulians placed in her leadership. Before entering politics, Rohey established successful businesses in the tourism sector across several African cities. Her entrepreneurial ventures deepened her understanding of economic development and prepared her for public service. This experience shaped her priorities in empowering women and youth through skills-building and entrepreneurship. Since coming into office, the mayor has spearheaded efforts to improve waste management systems and modernize public infrastructure, creating a cleaner and more sustainable city. An esteemed gender activist, she founded the Rohey Malick Lowe Women and Girls Empowerment Initiative that invests in women's financial independence and empowers youth to contribute to national socio-economic development. She is the 2nd Vice Chairperson of the Global Parliament of Mayors, President of the Network of Local Elected Women of Africa known by its French acronym Refela and 2nd Vice President of the United Democratic Party.

She is a term member of the Council on Foreign Relations and a Strategy and Statecraft Fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

He hosted the UN Habitat III Conference and held leadership roles in major global city networks (UCLG, C40, Global Covenant of Mayors, ICLEI). Currently, he is a Visiting Professor at the University of Pennsylvania, Senior Advisor at the Atlantic Council Resilient Center, UN Committee of Experts on Public Administration member, and co-chairs the SDSN Global Commission for Urban SDG Finance. He also leads Meridio Consulting, advising cities worldwide, and has supported Riyadh's U20 and urban diplomacy efforts. 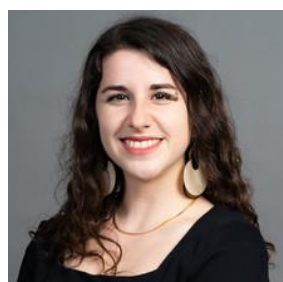

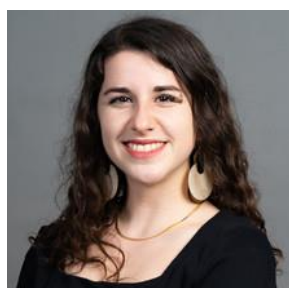
Chandra Farley, Atlanta, United States of America

Anacláudia Rossbach is the Executive Director of UN-Habitat and an economist with over 20 years of experience in housing, informal settlements, and urban policies. She was appointed Executive Director of UN-Habitat at the Under-Secretary-General level by the General Assembly, following nomination by the UN Secretary-General on 7 June 2024. Prior to this role, she was the Director for Latin America and the Caribbean at the Lincoln Institute of Land Policy and served as Regional Manager for Cities Alliance, where she founded the Urban Housing Practitioners Hub. Prior to that, with the World Bank, she oversaw the development and implementation of Brazilian housing and slum-upgrading policies. Ms. Rossbach has actively contributed to global urban policy discussions and has a strong academic presence in the field. She took office on 12 August 2024.

Sithole Mbanga, CEO - SALGA

Previously CEO of the South African Cities Network (SACN), he played a key role in strengthening urban governance and municipal development. In this capacity, he managed staff in the Deputy Secretary-General's Office, focusing on repositioning the UN development system and strengthening the Resident Coordinators system. As a strategic coordinator and policy adviser, Mr. Muffuh played a key role in guiding the UN's response to the Covid-19 pandemic, organizing summits on Financing for Development and Climate Action. He also coordinated the Global Crisis Group's efforts on the UN's response to the war in Ukraine and the Decade of Action for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Prior to joining the DSG's Office, Mr. Muffuh shaped and coordinated partnership engagements, contributing to the formulation of strategies for the post-2015 development policy, resulting in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its accompanying SDGs. Throughout his UN career at regional and country levels and at the UN Secretariat, he gained extensive experience in program coordination, management, partnerships, communications, stakeholder engagement, advocacy, and mobilization. 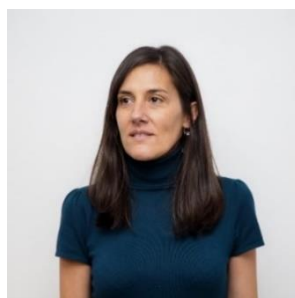

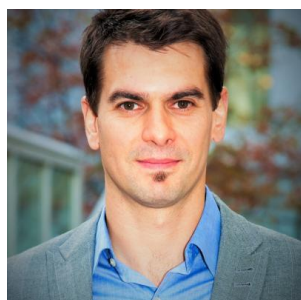
Ana Ciuti, U20 Sherpa Buenos Aires, Argentina

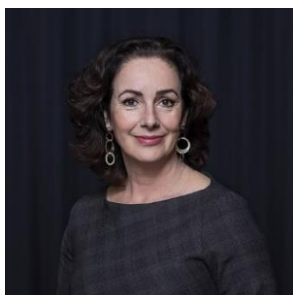

She is also a documentary filmmaker, having worked on projects like "Seks en de Zonde" (Sex and Sin), a six-part documentary series about the position of women in the Islamic world. She has also been involved with various charitable organizations, including serving as chairwoman of Stichting Vluchteling (Refugee Foundation) since 2011 and chairwoman of Aidsfonds/Stopaidsnow since 2017.

Track 2 Session 5: Title: “Housing and Local Governance: Civil society propositions to advance care and climate justice”.

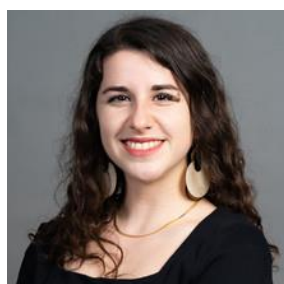

Jane Battersby, Urban food security expert, Senior researcher at the African Centre for Cities, University of Cape Town

She is an Associate Professor in the Department of Environmental & Geographical Science at the University of Cape Town, and a Research Associate of the African Centre for Cities. Her current areas of particular interest are urban food systems, urban food policies and the construction of food security theory in Northern and Southern research contexts. This work has both theoretical and applied components. Underpinning her food work is an ongoing interest in the linkages between spatial transformation and identity transformation in post-apartheid urban areas – a topic she has addressed through the lenses of youth identities, education, music and land restitution. Jane holds a PhD from Oxford University, a Masters from the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne and a BSc (Hons) from Kings College, London.



Dr. Cemil Tugay, Mayor of İzmir Metropolitan Municipality

Dr. Cemil Tugay is a medical doctor and experienced public leader with a distinguished career spanning healthcare, academia, and local governance. He graduated from the Faculty of Medicine at Ege University in 1989 and initially served as a general practitioner in Çorum and Tire. Between 1993 and 2000, he specialized in Plastic Surgery at İzmir Atatürk Training and Research Hospital, where he also completed his specialist doctorate. During this period, he broadened his expertise with a year of research at the Cleveland Clinic in the United States. Following his specialization, Dr. Tugay worked as a Plastic Surgery specialist at Karşıyaka Public Hospital (2001–2005) and İzmir Çiğli Kent Hospital (2005–2009), before establishing his own private practice in Karşıyaka in 2009. Alongside his medical career, he became actively involved in professional associations, serving in leadership positions within the Turkish Medical Association, the İzmir Chamber of Medicine, and the Turkish Plastic Surgery Association. Dr. Tugay entered public service as a member of the Republican People’s Party (CHP) in 2010, holding several executive and advisory roles within the party at provincial and district levels. In 2019, he was elected Mayor of Karşıyaka Municipality, a position he held until 2024. In June 2024, Dr. Tugay was elected President of the Union of Healthy Cities of Turkey, where he continues to champion policies that promote healthier, more sustainable urban environments.

Tobia Zevi, Deputy Mayor Rome, Italy



Tobia Zevi has always been active in his community, combining political engagement with civic and social commitment. He has held various institutional roles, working at the Province of Rome, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, and the Presidency of the Council. As the Deputy Mayor for Housing and Patrimony of Rome, he is addressing some crucial challenges for the city, including the digitalization and census of municipal properties, a new housing plan to fight housing poverty, the opening of public assets to increase services to citizens, the urban regeneration of large municipal owned complexes and the management of state-owned maritime property. He is also responsible for the Global Cities Program at the Institute for International Political Studies (ISPI) in Milan: an observatory on the most populous and influential metropolises on the planet, which constitutes a privileged point of view on the new challenges of global cities and on good practices.
